Course Description: Beginning Lighting Design (TH 428) (3 Credit Hours) introduces and begins to develop the understanding and skills that students would utilize as a theatrical lighting designer. Class activities include reading, writing, research, drafting, and other design related activities that focus on the <u>design</u> process.

Course Objective: The instructor will cover techniques of designing lighting for various stage forms, creative planning and designs for specific productions. The instructor will cover the fundaments of learning how to explore the mind's eye, and learning to paint with light. How to design to the text, create atmospheres and worlds, and how to transition from one to another. Fundamentals of the lighting designer, preparation for the theatre, production techniques and assistant lighting designer skills will be covered.

Learner Outcomes:

- 1) The Students will research: Research Morgue, Inspiration Photos, Lighting Schematic, Color Choices
- The Students will learn how to do a Designer Play Analysis: Analyze the understanding of how lighting adds to the story from A to B and B to C and C to D. How is the designer always adding to the story? (Backwards & Forwards, Hodge Analysis)
- 3) The Students will learn how to create various paperwork: Create French Scene Charts, Create Cue Lists, Create Magic Sheets, and Create Lighting Plots and apply them to professional level work.

Course Assignments: There are four (4) major projects, Four (4) minor projects, two (2) theatrical production papers, one (1) dance paper, one (1) paper over a historical relevant lighting designer. Your full participation in class discussions, exercises, online exercises and projects is expected.

Attendance at Theatrical Productions and Papers: Students are required to attend two (2) theatre productions and the one (1) dance concert and write a critique/review about each production, details to be determined by the Professor. A writing prompt will be given closer to the assignment due date.

Plan your semester break departure carefully. There will be NO early exams for students attempting an early departure at the semester's end.

Attendance and Tardiness Policy:

Attendance is mandatory and records will be kept. You are given <u>three (3) unexcused absences for the</u> <u>semester without penalty</u>. After the third unexcused absence, <u>each additional unexcused absence will</u> <u>lower your final course grade by 1/3 letter grade</u> (A- to B+, B to B-, B- to C, etc.). In cases of extreme hardship, exceptions may be made at the discretion of the instructor.

The only absences that will be excused are those due to a verifiable emergency such as: illness requiring attention by a health care provider; the hospitalization, death, or serious illness of a family member; a verifiable and University-sanctioned event; or required appearance in a court of law. You are responsible for **providing documentation** (e.g. doctor's letter, health center note, court summons, obituary) **unsolicited** to your professor **within 48 hours of your absence** if you wish to be considered excused.

Even if you are legitimately absent (e.g., illness, athletic or scholastic event, etc.), you are responsible for all the information given in that class. This may include any changes in the printed schedule, and will include lecture materials and screenings not found in the reading assignment for the day.

Tardiness:

Three (3) tardies will be treated as one unexcused absence.

-If you arrive to class more than ten minutes late, you are considered absent.

-If you arrive late for any exam and any other student has already completed the exam and left the classroom, you will not be permitted to take it and will receive a "0".

-Leaving class early without prior permission from instructor will be tallied under tardies.

Severe Weather Guidelines

The guiding principle at The University of Alabama is to promote the personal safety of our students, faculty and staff during severe weather events. UA is a residential campus with many students living on or near campus. In general classes will remain in session until the National Weather Service issues safety warnings for the city of Tuscaloosa. Clearly, some students and faculty commute from adjacent counties. These counties may experience weather related problems not encountered in Tuscaloosa. Individuals should follow the advice of the National Weather Service for that area taking the necessary precautions to ensure personal safety. Whenever the National Weather Service and the Emergency Management Agency issue a warning, people in the path of the storm (tornado or severe thunderstorm) should take immediate life-saving actions.

When West Alabama is under a severe weather advisory, conditions can change rapidly. It is imperative to get to where you can receive information from the <u>National Weather Service</u> and to follow the instructions provided. Personal safety should dictate the actions that faculty, staff and students take.

The Office of University Relations will disseminate the latest information regarding conditions on campus in the following ways:

- Weather advisory broadcast over WVUA at 90.7 FM
- Weather advisory broadcast over Alabama Public Radio (WUAL) at 91.5 FM
- Weather advisory broadcast over WVUA-TV/WUOA-TV, and on the website at http://wvua23.com/weather.

In the case of a tornado warning (tornado has been sighted or detected by radar; sirens activated), all university activities are automatically suspended, including all classes and laboratories. If you are in a building, please move immediately to the lowest level and toward the center of the building away from windows (interior classrooms, offices, or corridors) and remain there until the tornado warning has expired. Classes in session when the tornado warning is issued can resume immediately after the warning has expired at the discretion of the instructor. Classes that have not yet begun will resume 30 minutes after the tornado warning has expired provided at least half of the class period remains.
