COURSE DESCRIPTION: Lecture-based and hands-on training in theatrical lighting implementation; 3 cr. Provide the introductory undergraduate level design & technical student an in-depth understanding of the technical aspects of stage lighting, including implementation and maintenance of lighting fixtures, cables, and control equipment; and a thorough understanding of stage lighting science, terminology, technique, and professionalism.

REQUIRED MATERIALS: A pocket notepad and writing utensil for notes; smartphones and recording devices are acceptable if not misused or distributed without my express permission. Laptops are acceptable on lecture-only days, but will be too cumbersome for practical days. You must bring a 6" or 8" adjustable-head crescent wrench to every class session. You may also benefit from bringing these items: multitool, pocketknife (4" or less), flashlight, gloves. Required text: <u>Theatrical Design and Production</u> (8th edition) by J. Michael Gillette. Recommended texts: <u>Backstage Handbook</u> by Paul Carter and George Chiang; <u>Stage Lighting: The Technician's Guide</u> by Skip Mort.

CLASS OBJECTIVES: The professor will discuss and demonstrate theatrical/event lighting equipment, terminology, implementation, and safety. The professor will review professionalism in the theatre/event production industry.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES: Students will evaluate lighting implementation in practice. Students will serve on an electrics crew. Students will develop a sense of professionalism and perform accordingly. Students will identify stage technology and discuss methods of use. Students who succeed in this course should be able to fulfill the duties of an Electrician at the regional theatre level or union stagehand, including implementation and maintenance of lighting fixtures, cables, and control equipment; and complemented by a thorough understanding of stage lighting science, terminology, technique, and professionalism.

CLASS GUIDELINES, HEALTH AND SAFETY: You are required to work at heights to complete this course. As this class focuses on professionalism, it is required to comport yourselves with the utmost work ethic and attitude. This means you must arrive on time, dressed appropriately, with your materials. You must display a positive attitude, eagerness to work, and attentiveness to your surroundings and instructions. You may lose professionalism points and/or hours for infractions including but not limited to: use of electronic devices without approval, improper clothing, failure to bring materials, exhaustion, illness, intoxication, or poor attitude. Your health and safety are of the highest importance. Everyone's safety is everyone's responsibility; if you see

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something that appears unsafe, notify the people in danger and the supervisor immediately. Do not do anything you feel unsafe doing; if you feel unsafe with a specific task, tell the supervisor and we will find a way to accomplish the goal safely. When working at heights (loading gallery, grid, personnel lift, ladders, etc.) your pockets must be empty and tools attached to you. If loose hardware must be used at heights, warn the space with "loose hardware over [location in space]" before loosening hardware. Do not operate machinery or power tools without the proper apparel, training, supervision, and personal protective equipment (safety eyewear, hard hat, respirator, gloves, welding mask, etc.). Proper apparel must be able to get dirty, torn, and used at heights or in awkward positions without compromising one's integrity or safety. This also means no physically restrictive clothing, no dangly strings or jewelry that could get caught in machinery, and closed-toe shoes only. Judgment of the properness of one's attire is at the discretion of the instructor/supervisor. Check your UA email daily.

In the case of a tornado warning (tornado has been sighted or detected by radar; sirens activated), all university activities are automatically suspended, including all classes and laboratories.
